Opening Concert in the Club



Soulful East

There is a very strong tradition of culture in Russia, and of music in particular. Few other countries have produced so many major composers, despite the hardships that they experienced. Our 2023 program will focus on celebrating three of the most famous Russian composers: Rachmaninoff, Tchaikovsky and Prokofiev. Rachmaninoff was born 150 years ago and died 70 years later in Beverly Hills. We will hear his expressive Trio élégiaque No. I that he composed when he was only 18 years old and that reflects his melancholic character. Rachmaninoff's primary role model was Tchaikovsky - he died 130 years ago and "Valse sentimentale" is the sixth of his "Six Morceaux", originally composed for solo piano in 1882. To finish, we will remember Prokofiev, who died 70 years ago in Moscow on 5 March 1953 - the same day as Stalin. In between these pieces, Ksenija Sidorova will play "Cinderella" by the balalaika player Alexey Arkhipovsky - a piece that her father discovered for her on YouTube.

The second half of the evening will be a counterpoint to this Russian selection, with talented pianist Alice Sara Ott presenting a personal selection of works by French composers Chopin and Satie, heralding the next evening concert.

On the 60th anniversary of the death of Francis Poulenc

À la française

We're dedicating this evening to the sophisticated French master, Francis Poulenc. He died almost 60 years ago to the day in Paris and left behind a plethora of incredible music. Poulenc was a member of the group of composers known as "Les Six", whose clear, elegant musical style was a reaction against the impressionist music that emerged around 1890. He embraced the Dada movement's techniques and was inspired by popular melodies, creating distinct, exceptionally charming music. He completed his Sonata for Clarinet and Piano just before his death, and wrote "Les Chemins de l'amour", a song based on Jean Anouilh's play Léocadia, in 1942.

We are embedding Poulenc's pieces in precisely the music that "Les Six" wanted to rebel against, with Debussy and Ravel being the key figures in French impressionist music. By contrast, Camille Saint-Saëns - the master of the Belle Époque - strived to create "national French music". He was highly respected but his efforts made him a target of criticism who was accused of being a revolutionary and later, a reactionary who dismissed impression-ist music and yet - occasionally - he produced sounds that seem to foreshadow it. Finally, a French evening has to include a song, and we will hear "Sous le ciel de Paris" from 1951.

Homeland

The fifth composer in our anniverary celebrations is the Norwegian pianist and composer Edvard Grieg. 2023 will see the 180th anniversary of his birth. His music was strongly influenced by the popular folk music of his homeland and he is most well-known for his Peer Gynt Suites, although he preferred to compose piano pieces and chamber works. His Andante con Moto from 1878, however, remained his only piano trio.

Beethoven also wove folk music beautifully into his compositions, as seen in his many imaginative variations of Scottish and Irish folk songs and in his huge "hit", the Gassenhauer Trio.

Inbetween these, we will hear a song by German-Bohemian composer Adolf Strauss, written shortly before he was deported to Auschwitz, where he was killed in 1944 by the Nazis. Kurt Weill managed to flee to France in 1933, where he composed an opera that met with little success but included a piece that is still beloved today: Tango Habanera,

"Youkali". In 1938, Fritz Kreisler also emigrated to France and we will hear his magical Praeludium and Allegro (in the style of Gaetano Pugnani), in the version for mandolin and accordion.

From Bach to Brahms

To round off the festival at Villa Honegg, we will celebrate Brahms' 190th birthday. He is without a doubt one of the greatest composers of all time and left behind a treasure trove of orchestral works and chamber music. Brahms wasn't focused on revolutionising everything that had come before; his music was founded on Baroque and Classical forms. It is therefore fitting that the first piece we will hear is Bach's Partita No 2 in D minor and songs from Schubert's "Winterreise" – but special versions of both pieces, including mandolins and an accordion. And who knows, maybe he would also have enjoyed the unfathomably virtuoso Prelude by the Sicilian "post-minimalist" composer Giovanni Sollima, who wrote this piece especially for Avi Avital.

Another constant in Brahms' compositions was the integration of Hungarian folk music. It fascinated and inspired him, and can be clearly heard in his Piano Quartet No I in G minor and its last movement, "Rondo alla Zingarese". Brahms' Hungarian friend Joseph Joachim admitted without rancour that this piece was a "highly proficient move" into his own musical territory.
